Did you know that Ireland has a secret fur trade?

There are currently 3 mink farms in the country, located in Laois, Donegal and Kerry. Around 200,000 mink are bred on these farms every year, simply for the sake of the fashion industry. They are kept in tiny cages their entire lives, and at 6 months of age, are thrown into a box and gassed to death.

Veterinary Ireland supports the bill, and recently even published a report on the issue, recommending that there should be “an immediate ban on the farming of mink”. Every other animal rights and welfare group in the country supports the bill, as do the majority of political parties and TDs. However, Fine Gael continue to defend this barbaric industry, and Fianna Fáil has yet to make a decision on the issue.
