
From Seattle to Rio de Janeiro, from Genoa to Indonesia young people are revolting against the capitalist system which oppresses the majority and hugely enriches a tiny minority. The anti-capitalist movement is an expression of the anger which exists against the system, politically, economically and socially. In the South of Ireland, it is clear that the political establishment only serve the interests of big business. The entire system reeks of corruption. In Northern Ireland, the politics of sectarianism can only offer poverty and sectarian conflict. A nightmare vision of a return to sectarian war must be cut across by building a socialist movement of young people, uniting Protestant and Catholic.
